

RECALLED OLD BATTLES.

Veterans of the 35th Regt
at East **Weymouth**.

Annual Reunion on the Anniversary of
the Battle of Antietam.

Association the Guests of Company H,
Which Went from **Weymouth** in 62.

EAST **WEYMOUTH**, Sept 17 — Another year has passed and the members of the gallant 35th regiment, M V M, have observed a day sacred in their memory, the anniversary of the battle of Antietam, being the guests of Co H, the **Weymouth** company, today.

This regiment mustered in 62, and after a short encampment at Lynnfield, Mass, was sent to the front, and was in the engagement at South Mountain on Sept 14, where a part of their regiment was terribly cut up. On the 17th of this month they were at Antietam, and the "boys in blue" of this regiment,

who have survived and can now look back upon that battle, speak of it as one of the most terrific of any they passed through.

In the words of their commander, Gen "Nat" Wales, the "boys" that composed that regiment were "out for blood" on that day and upheld the stars and stripes with credit to themselves and nation.

The regiment was first to enter Jackson, Miss, and place its flag upon the state house in place of the stars and bars that was floating there.

The banner which they had with them today was a fac simile of the one that they carried throughout the war, and by a special permit from the secretary of war the following battles in which the regiment were engaged were inscribed upon it:

South Mountain, Sept 14; Antietam, Sept 17; White Sulphur Springs, November; Fredericksburg, Dec 13, 1862; Vicksburg and Jackson, July, 1863; Knoxville, December, 1863; Wilderness, Spotsylvania, North Anna River, May; Cold Harbor, June; Petersburg Mine, July; Weldon Railroad, August; Poplar Spring Church, October, 1864. Capture of Petersburg, April; Garrison, Fort Hill, to end of the siege of 1865.

Co H, whose honor it was to entertain the regiment today, was recruited in August, 1862, and in the early part of September was campaigning in Maryland.

The regiment assembled at Braintree early this morning, where they were met by the committee in charge of the affair: Waldo Turner, George P. Lyons, Charles Hawes, C. G. Morrill and T. B. Loud. Special electric cars were boarded at the station and the veterans proceeded to ride to Weymouth, thence to South Weymouth, where a brief stop was made and the guests were served a light lunch by Josiah Reed.

The residences and public buildings along the route were attired in red, white and blue in honor of the guests.

The journey was taken up again to East Weymouth, where they held the 30th business session in G. A. R. hall. After the reports of the various officers were heard, President Wales appointed a nominating committee to nominate officers for the ensuing year.
